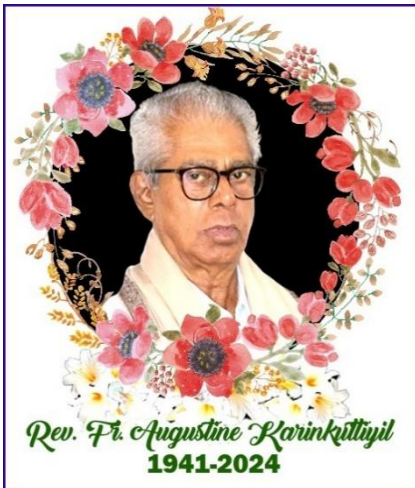

IN REMEMBRANCE AND GRATITUDE FR. AUGUSTINE KARINKUTTIYIL



Rev. Fr. Augustine Karinkuttiyil, a Pioneer Director of Jana Vikas is known for his dedication, and deep commitment for social change in the district of Kandhamal. Starting with limited resources, he founded Jana Vikas to address poverty, inequality, and lack of opportunity in rural areas. His leadership transformed a small initiative into a respected institution driving impactful development.

Rev. Fr. Augustine was born on July 9, 1941 in Kurinji, Ramapuram, Kerala. He was part of a family of eight siblings, consisting of four brothers and three sisters. After completing his schooling, he decided to be a priest in the Archdiocese of Cuttack-Bhubaneswar, Odisha. In 1981, he took on the role of Director of

Catholic Charities, Khurda Road, Jatni, where he served for a decade. His work with Catholic Charities transformed into a deeper mission of social animation and community empowerment. With the permission of Archdiocese, he started Jana Vikas in 1988. In 1999, he coordinated rehabilitation programs following the Super Cyclone, focusing on community restoration in the coastal areas of Jagatsinghpur and Puri districts.

He was one of the pioneer members of Phulbani Action Group (PAG), a network of NGOs in Kandhamal district. He was a strong advocate for women's empowerment, he formed self-help groups, vocational training, and social awareness, eradication of blind believes, helping thousands of women gain economic independence and leadership roles.

In education, he established community learning centers and bridge schools, ensuring access to quality education for underprivileged children. His efforts motivated tribal parents to send children to schools.

His rural development initiatives focused on sustainable agriculture, clean water, sanitation, and skill-building. These holistic programs revived village economies and improved living standards.

Through grassroots innovation and inclusive models, his work empowered entire communities to become self-reliant. Though he may have worked quietly, his impact speaks volumes – seen in the educated youth, confident women, and thriving villages he helped shape. His legacy is a powerful reminder of how one person's vision can transform society.

On 17th September 2024, at the age of 85, he passed away leaving his footprint of dedication service and commitment to all the people irrespective of caste, creed, language and region. Jana Vikas family will continue to cherish his sacrificial service for transforming lives with vision, courage, and compassion.

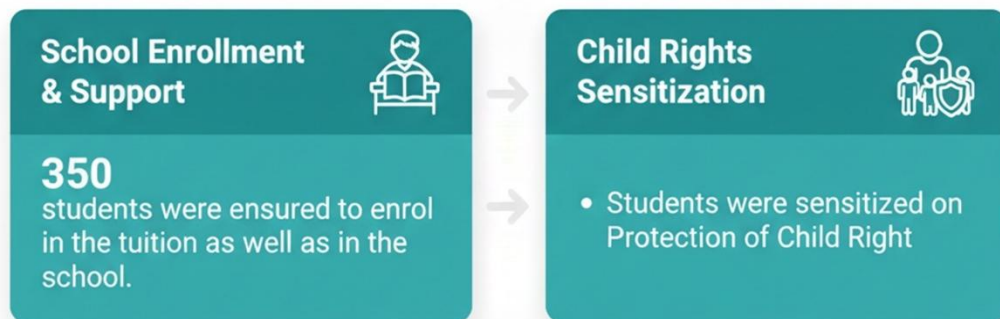

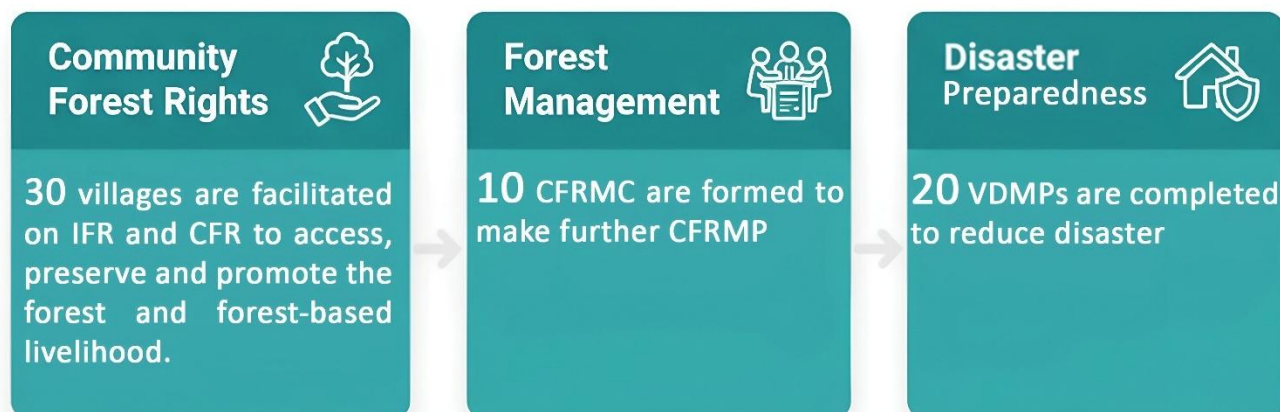

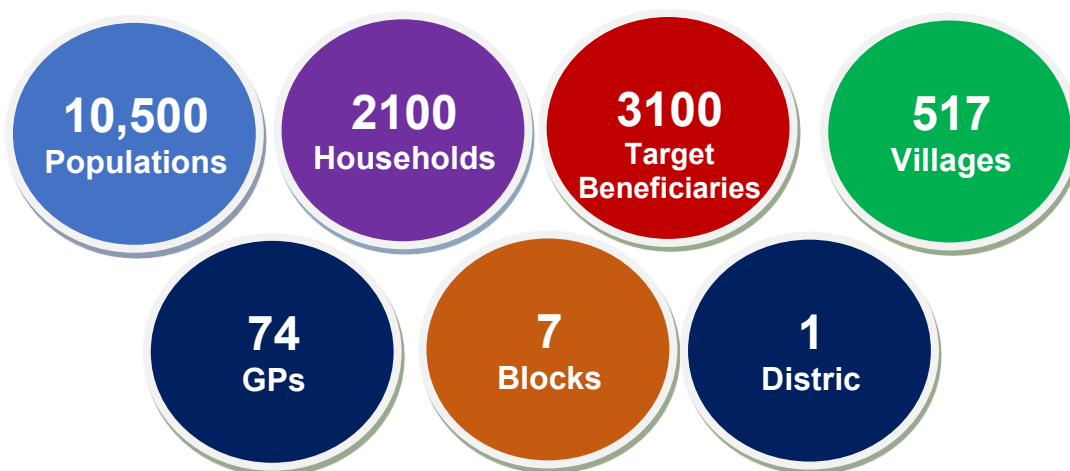

BUILDING SUSTAINABLE RURAL LIVELIHOODS



Jana Vikas's livelihood interventions have reached out to around



ODISHA MILLET MISSION (OMM)/ SHREE ANNA ABHIYAN (SAA):

The **Odisha Millet Mission (OMM)** and later renamed **Shree Anna Abhiyan (SAA)** is a flagship initiative of the Government of Odisha aimed at the revival of traditional millet-based farming and food systems. As a partner NGO, **Jana Vikas** has been implementing OMM in the **G. Udayagiri block** of **Kandhamal district**, which is home to predominantly tribal populations with a rich history of millet cultivation.



Milletts are not only climate-resilient and nutritionally rich, but also culturally significant for the tribal communities of Kandhamal. Jana Vikas has worked to bring back these traditional grains into both **farming systems** and **daily diets**, while creating **livelihood opportunities** and enhancing **agroecological resilience**.

The Odisha Millet Mission implementation by **Jana Vikas** in G. Udayagiri block has successfully revived a forgotten grain, turning it into a **nutritional asset**, **income generator**, and **climate-resilient crop**. The integrated approach combining **production**, **consumption**, **value addition**, and **market access** has made millets a symbol of **food sovereignty** and **tribal pride** in the region.

Training Farmers on Millets Production and Consumption:

Jana Vikas conducted Residential/non-residential training within the district empowers women campaign teams, especially SHG members, with skills in millet cultivation, processing, and marketing. It fosters local leadership, ensures accessibility, builds confidence, and enhances their role in promoting nutrition, sustainability, and income generation under the Millet Mission.



Awareness campaigns in villages to increase household consumption of millets.



Village-level awareness campaigns promote millet consumption by highlighting health benefits, traditional recipes, and cooking methods. Through demonstrations through "Rath Awareness Campaigns", and local champions, these campaigns revive food traditions, dispel myths, and encourage daily use of millets, supporting nutrition, sustainability, and the goals of the Millet Mission.

These campaigns, organized by trained women "master trainers," aim to educate families about the nutritional value of millets and encourage their integration into daily meals. 2 nos of 4 days village level campaign rath was organized by FA, Jana Vikas to create awareness in household level consumption.

Organizing of field day at community:



Field Day showcases successful millet cultivation practices directly in farmers' fields. It facilitates peer learning, encourages adoption of improved techniques, and builds confidence among farmers through real-time observation. Organized locally, it strengthens community engagement and supports widespread replication under the Millet Mission. Field days are a key component of the mission, providing a platform for farmers to learn improved agronomic practices and showcase successful millet cultivation techniques. 4nos of field day programme was organized by facilitating Agency Jana Vikas in different location of G, Udayagiri block. The participants were in the

programme were farmers, SHG members, PRI members, ASHAs, AWWs, staffs from agriculture departments.



Demonstration of crop-cutting experiments (CCE):



Crop-Cutting Experiments (CCEs) under the Odisha Millet Mission (OMM) play a crucial role in improving the quality, accuracy, and reliability of millet yield data, which directly supports better planning, procurement, and promotion of millets in Odisha.

50 no's of these experiments conducted different villages of G. Udayagiri block to provide data on millet production under different farming practices. The data from these CCEs, along with other factors like area cultivated and market prices, are used to estimate production and value of

produce.

Workshops with ICDS and pri members and food festivals.

Workshops and food festivals are key **community engagement strategies** under the **Odisha Millet Mission (OMM)**, particularly involving **ICDS (Integrated Child Development Services)** functionaries and **PRI (Panchayati Raj Institutions)** members. These initiatives aim to **mainstream millets in local food systems**, increase awareness, and ensure **institutional support** for millet promotion.

The purpose of the ICDS Functionaries (Anganwadi workers, supervisors) was to promote millet-based meals

Campaigns on Procurement & Marketing.

Procurement and marketing are two critical pillars of the **Odisha Millet Mission (OMM)**. To ensure that millet farmers receive **fair prices** and that millet-based products reach wider markets, OMM runs **targeted campaigns** across the state. These campaigns aim to promote awareness, build trust in the procurement system, and stimulate demand for millets through structured

in Anganwadis (AWCs), Train workers on nutrition and millet-based recipe preparation, and Encourage millet inclusion in Take-Home Rations (THR). Involvement of PRI Members (Sarpanch, Ward Members, Panchayat Secretaries) was to mobilize community support for millet cultivation and consumption, facilitate smooth millet procurement and inclusion in local schemes, and encourage use of millet in community events and local institutions.

marketing strategies. This is done through "Rath" (chariot) campaigns to raise awareness about millet procurement and its benefits. These campaigns aim to educate farmers and the wider community about the nutritional value of millets, improved cultivation practices, and the government's procurement process.

Millets increased income of Mr. Bandhuraj Pradhan



Mr. Bandhuraj Pradhan and his wife Mrs. Subojini Pradhan are the smallholder farmer from Soberkhol village of Kalingia GP under G. Udayagiri Block of Kandhamal district. Under the Shree Anna Abhyan (SAA) program, Jana Vikas staff made known to Mr. Bandhuraj Pradhan millet cultivation. After knowing the benefit of millet cultivation, they were encouraged to cultivate millets more besides paddy and pulses. Mr. Pradhan attended training on improved ragi cultivation practices many times and motivated to start ragi cultivation from



2024-25. He started from 1 acre in 2024-25 cultivating ragi. He got 1 quintal 50 Kgs. Out 1.50 Kgs, he sold 1 quintal and received ₹. 4500 and kept 50 Kgs for his consumption. He could get ₹. 4000/- as an incentive. He adapted the System of Millet Intensification (SMI) methods which gave him more yield.

SPECIAL PROGRAM FOR PROMOTION OF INTEGRATED FARMING IN TRIBAL AREAS (SPPIF)

The Special Program for Promotion of Integrated Farming (SPPIF) is a flagship initiative aimed at enhancing the livelihoods of small and marginal farmers through the adoption of integrated and sustainable farming practices. In Kotagarh Block of Kandhamal district, where agriculture is largely rain-fed and subsistence-based, SPPIF has played a transformative role by improving productivity, increasing income diversification, and strengthening food security among tribal and marginalized communities.

Jana Vikas was fortunate to implement the *Special Program for Promotion of Integrated Farming in Tribal Areas (SPPIF)* project in Kotagarh block of Kandhamal district. The focus of this project by government of Odisha is to implement "Special Program for Promotion

of Integrated Farming in Tribal Areas (SPPIF) to enhance the income and food security of the tribal families with the component of integration of different production systems such as **Agriculture, Horticulture, Livestock, Fisheries, Agro-Forestry** through integration of various convergence schemes. Directorate of Agriculture as a nodal agency and ATMA is the district level nodal agencies to support.

The SPPIF scheme aims to achieve comprehensive development of agriculture, horticulture, livestock, and fisheries sectors in the tribal areas of Kotagarh Block. It focuses on technology diffusion, establishing community-level institutions, managing natural resources, and using organic inputs in an integrated manner. Key features of the scheme include promoting protective irrigation,

improved agronomic practices, crop diversification, soil health management, community-managed seed systems, and various livestock development initiatives. The

scheme also emphasizes the formation of Farmers' Producer Organizations (FPOs) and farmer-to-farmer learning as core implementation strategies.

AGRICULTURE COMPONENT

Crop diversification /intercropping method:

Jana Vikas facilitated crop-diversification and intercropping activity in mid-land and up-lands from Paddy to Non- Paddy cultivation with the focus promoting pulses and oil seeds (Black Gram, Mustard, Green Gram, Arhar, Ground nut, Maze and Nizer). In the FY- 2024-2025 total target was 240 hectares covering 600 farm families such as Durgapanga, Dharakote and Sartul GPs. Crop combinations were Black Gram + Red gram 30 Hectar, Black Gram + Maze 100 hector, Green Gram + Mustard 40 Hectar and solo crop were Black gram 50 Hectar and Nizer 20 Hectar; the seeds were supplied by OSSC. Technical and structural Support provided to farmers for the better use of natural resources and to manage it successfully and that led them to harvest 4 to 5 quintals of seeds.



PVT/Mass Selection:



Participatory Varietal Trail (PVT) also was conducted at Lasserri village of Durgapanga GP where the purpose was to multiplication of 2 variety of seeds.

PVT ensured that **farmers themselves are involved** in selecting and evaluating crop varieties based on real-world performance under their own local conditions (soil, rainfall, elevation, etc.). The purpose was moved away from **"lab-to-land"** to **"land-to-lab"** **feedback** and empowers farmers as **co-researchers, not just recipients**. Farmers too produced 60 to 65 KGs of black gram seeds of 2 varieties (Ranga Biri & Dhala Biri).

HORTICULTURE COMPONENT

Trellis System of vegetable cultivation 10 cent model:

The purpose of adapting this model of vegetable cultivation is to **improve Yield and Quality of Vegetables with the impact of**



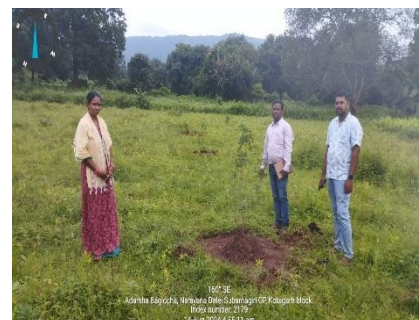
- Climbers and creepers like **bottle gourd, ridge gourd, bitter gourd, cucumber, beans, and pumpkin** benefit significantly from vertical support.
- The trellis system allows **better sunlight exposure, air circulation, and reduced disease** due to less ground contact.
- Yields can **increase by 30–50%**, and fruit quality improves (straighter, cleaner, unbruised vegetables).
- During the reporting period, 200 unit covered two hundred farmers at Durgapanga, Dharakote and Sartul Gram Panchayat of Kotagarh block.

Aggro Forestry Model/ Adarsha Bagichha:



The Agroforestry Model (Adarsha Bagichha) under SPPIF is a transformational approach to turning underutilized tribal lands into vibrant, income-generating, eco-friendly farms—improving livelihoods, food security, and ecological balance in blocks like Kottagarh.

Jana Vikas facilitated Aggro-forestry Model/ Adarsha Bagichha in 15 Acres of land has been developed as Adarsha Bagichha to create forest species and to control soil erosion and to preserve ground water in the village community successfully. This was used in Upland and Midland of farmers was used, in this activity forest species plantation, horticultural plantation, seasonal crops and peripheral plantation was done in collaboration with Watershed Department. A unit of vermin compost was constructed for natural farming methods, in farmers home where farmers keep cow and goat. The impact of the program was



- Adarsha Bagichha aligns with traditional farming knowledge of tribal communities.
- Encourages organic practices (many areas are already low-input or organic by default).
- Promotes community orchards and cluster-based development, helping smallholders benefit from economies of scale.

LIVESTOCK COMPONENT

Support for Goat Shelter:



380 units were constructed at Dharakote, Durgapanga and Sartul GP of Kotagarh block successfully and this program really benefitted the farmers who have got income of average Rs 40 to 50 thousand annually by selling goat in the market. Besides, the benefit from selling, they also were provided incentive to their bank accounts for successfully installing the shelter after the verifications of block level Veterinary officers and BTT Committee members.

Impact of this program was visible through improved Animal Health and Survival Rate in following ways:

- Providing well-ventilated, raised, and dry shelters significantly reduces:
 - Mortality due to cold, rain, and diseases
 - Parasitic infestations (e.g., foot rot, diarrhea)
 - Respiratory and skin infections
- Healthy goats grow faster, reproduce better, and fetch higher market value. Mortality rates can drop from 25–30% to less than 10%, especially among kids.

Establishment of Indigenous Chicks Production Unit (ICPU):

In the reporting year 3 units to ICPUs were constructed with the aim to create a supply chain of Chicks/ growers and adult birds on a regular basis to the Poultry Night shelters of those areas through cluster approach and it was successfully constructed. Farmers got opportunity of running the unit and getting earning to become entrepreneurs in their village communities. Livelihood support in the form of 50 birds of 4–5-month-old with a farm shed and fencing, feed, vaccination, and supplementation, feeders and drinkers, Azolla Pit, egg laying box, were provided to farmers, as a result farmers earned income of 60 to 70 thousand in a year which improved their financial strength and helped them in saving some money.

Impact of this program brought:

- Lower mortality
- Faster growth
- Better income
- Helps scale up from subsistence-level poultry to semi-commercial backyard poultry.

Support for Poultry Night Shelter Construction:



Construction of Poultry Night Shelter at village community was also another milestone to promote among farmers, In the year 2024-2025 500 PNS units were successfully implemented at Dharakote, Durgapanga and Sartul Gram Panchayat of Kotagarh Block. On thousand farmers had received asbestos, wire mesh, cement, earlier farmers used to keep cocks and hens in a traditional way but now with well ventilation and free space they nurture their chicks and hens which is safest and better than before with regarding to their mortality and free movement.

Support for Poultry Vaccine:

Jana Vikas covered 1324 families supporting Poultry vaccination to overcome various types of poultry and goat diseases which cause mortality in poultry and goat rearing. Women Para workers and CRPs were trained through training programs with the handholding support of Block Veterinary Officer (BVO), Livestock Inspectors (LIs). As per the guideline CRPs were collected data on livestock population and disease frequency through village meetings. Jana Vikas prepared vaccine indent and submitted to AVS/BVO/CDVO at district level and prepared calendar with the support of VAS and LI for vaccination and according that program was implemented; total 1120 farm families of Madaguda, Kotagarh, Judabali, Dharakote, Durgapanga and Sartul GPs were covered vaccinating their livestock animals and birds. Through cold sore chain management 3 no of mini-refrigerators were also used to store vaccines and along with that vaccination kit such as vaccine ice box, cutter, scissors, tetracycline, bandages, ointment were also purchased and used during vaccination tours to village communities. The vaccination activities were extended to Srirampur, Jubaguda, Ora, and Subarnagiri GPs.



Establishment of commercial Goat rearing Unit through WSHG:



In the year 2024-2025, 2 no of WSHGs were supported giving 25% subsidy under SPPIF. This program has enhanced livelihoods and income through establishment of Goat rearing unit of the WSHGs. The members of the WSHGs have earned approximately annually Rs. 80000.00 by selling goat in the local market and this business has supported WSHGs and their family members increased their income to meet their family needs of food, health and education.

FISHERY COMPONENT

Support for quality fish seed stocking (Fingerling/Yearling):

- In the reporting period, 7 households were supported with fingerling/yearling and successfully netted fish and sold in the market and got profit with support of Assistant Fishery Officer (AFO), Kotagarh block with their existing ponds, farmers were also encouraged to purchase net for fishing and selling in the market, farmers sold in the market and got profit of 7 to 10 thousand yearly and some used for consumption purpose.
- The Special Program for Promotion of Integrated Farming in Kotagarh Block has had a meaningful impact in transitioning farmers from subsistence agriculture to more resilient, diverse, and market-linked livelihoods. With sustained investment and convergence, the initiative holds promise for long-term socio-economic upliftment of the tribal communities in the region.



FOSTERING INCLUSIVE GOVERNANCE



Jana Vikas has been facilitating capacity building for various grassroots leaders in convergence with Zilla Parishad (ZP) and Odisha Livelihood Mission (OLM) and other line departments, has prioritized **capacity building** of WSHGs as a central strategy to ensure **sustainable rural development**.

The **Zilla Parishad, Kandhamal**, through sustained capacity building of Women SHGs, is **not only creating economic opportunities**, but is also laying the foundation for a **more inclusive, equitable, and participatory rural governance system**. These women are no longer just beneficiaries—they are **leaders, entrepreneurs, and change-makers** in their communities.

Jana Vikas has conducted various training with the support and collaboration of Zilla Parishad and Odisha Livelihood Mission (OLM).

Basic Orientation Training for CRP-CMs



Basic Orientation Training for CRP-CMs (Community Resource Persons – Cluster/CLF-level or similar cadres) under the **Odisha Livelihoods Mission (OLM)**, Jana Vikas as a Facilitating Organization conducted training. CRP-CMs are local women (often SHG members or book keepers, etc.) who are given responsibility to handhold/support SHGs in formation, regular meetings, bookkeeping, Micro Investment Plans (MIP), facilitating linkages to banks, etc. Impact of this training was to increase the Knowledge & Skills of CRP-CMs- Better understanding of SHG norms, savings & credit processes; ability to do bookkeeping, prepare MIPs; improved clarity on their facilitation role. 30 CRP-CMs were capacitated.

Training on Lakhpati Didi of CRPs

Jana Vikas organized the Training on Lakhpati Didi of CRPs at Jana Vikas Training Hall. Training significantly enhances the capacity of CRPs under the Lakhpati Didi initiative by equipping them with skills in livelihood planning, financial literacy, enterprise development, and community mobilization. As a result, CRPs become effective catalysts in guiding SHG members towards income-generating activities, improving credit access, and promoting sustainable livelihoods. Trained CRPs drive behavior change, ensure better implementation of micro-enterprises, and help households reach the ₹1 lakh annual income mark. The training fosters leadership, confidence, and accountability among CRPs, directly impacting household incomes, women's empowerment, and overall community development. There were 390 members who were capacitated on Lakhpati Didi in 13th Batches for 30 members in one batch.



Training of Krushi Mitras on Sustainable Farmers

During the report period, Jana Vikas organized the Training on Krushi Mitras on Sustainable Farmers for CRPs at Jana Vikas Training Hall. Training of Krushi Mitras plays a crucial role in promoting sustainable farming practices among small and marginal farmers. It equips them with knowledge on climate-resilient agriculture, organic/natural farming, soil health management, and improved crop planning. Trained Krushi Mitras acts as grassroots agri-extension agents, guiding farmers on sustainable inputs, pest control, and efficient water use. This leads to reduced input costs, improved yields, and environmentally friendly practices. The training enhances farmer confidence, promotes adoption of eco-



friendly techniques, and strengthens local food systems—contributing to long-term sustainability, resilience to climate change, and increased incomes for farming households.

Training Program of MBKS

Jana Vikas had an opportunity to conduct the training in collaboration with Odisha Livelihood Mission (OLM). The training program for 250 MBKs (Master Book Keepers) significantly improves the financial management and accountability of Self-Help Groups (SHGs). It equips MBKs with skills in accurate bookkeeping, financial reporting, loan tracking, and digital record-keeping. Trained MBKs ensure timely and transparent maintenance of SHG records, enabling better decision-making, improved access to credit, and compliance with institutional norms. Their support builds SHG members' financial literacy and trust in group processes. Overall, the training enhances the efficiency, sustainability, and credibility of SHGs, contributing to stronger community institutions and improved livelihoods for women-led households.



Training of BPMs, DPMs & MBKs on Livelihood

Training of BPMs (Block Project Managers), DPMs (District Project Managers), and MBKs (Master Book Keepers) significantly strengthens the implementation of livelihood initiatives at multiple levels. 105 members were capacitated on this training. DPMs and BPMs gain strategic, technical, and managerial skills to plan, monitor, and support livelihood interventions effectively. MBKs, through enhanced financial and bookkeeping training, ensure transparency and accountability at the SHG level. Together, this capacity building leads to better convergence, resource mobilization, and execution of Micro Investment Plans (MIPs), resulting in improved income generation, enterprise development, and sustainability of livelihoods for rural households—especially women and marginalized groups under mission frameworks like OLM.



INTERVENTION ON MENTAL HEALTH:



IMPROVED PERSON WITH MENTAL ILLNESS IN KANDHAMAL DISTRICT



Mental health in Kandhamal is crucial to improving the overall well-being of its population. It requires a multi-pronged approach that combines medical treatment, community outreach, education, and local engagement. Building an infrastructure that provides accessible can make a significant difference in the lives of individuals and families. In Kandhamal district, people face challenges such as economic hardship, limited job opportunities, and often a lack of awareness about mental health. These factors can contribute to anxiety, depression, and other mental health issues.

The focus of our intervention was on creating awareness on **Mental Illness, Prevention, and Treatment Project** in **Four Blocks (K. Nuagoan, Daringbadi, Raikia and G. Udayagiri)** and by linking with the **District Mental Health Program (DMHP)**, Kandhamal for better health facilities for the Person with Mental Illness.

The intervention adopted a **holistic, inclusive and community-driven model approach**, addressing prevention, diagnosis, treatment, and psychosocial support.



Core Focus Intervention/strategy:



- **Identification of Person With Mental Illness:** This was an important to know the figures of PWMI in the target blocks and strategize the implementation plan.
- **Awareness Generation:** Educating community members about mental health, symptoms, and treatment through mike awareness, posters, awareness at hostels, village-level meetings and interface meeting with CHC, PHC, E-Sanjeevani and DMHP.
- **Screening and Diagnosis:** Organizing mental health camps

and home visits to identify individuals needing psychiatric care.

- **Counselling and Medical Treatment:** Providing access to psychiatrists as well as ensuring availability of psychotropic medications through local health centers.
- **Capacity Building:** Training frontline health workers, ASHA and Project Staff to recognize early signs of mental illness and make timely referrals.
- **Community Support Systems:** Forming peer groups and family support networks to reduce isolation and promote reintegration of patients into community life.



During the report period, 692 PWMI are identified, 322 nos. are registered under DHMP, 322 nos. are provided medicines and 93 nos. are in recovering stage.

In order to have close coordination and collaboration from CHC/PHC staff and for more clarity on the mental illness and better service, Jana Vikas organized several workshops at block and district level by the support of District Mental Health Program Unit (DMHP) staff. These collaborative efforts increased registration and treatment.

Through this the project staff got opportunity to build the relationship with the district level staff to provide the service better and give medicines to the care takers or staff to reach to PWMIs.

HANDHOLDING SUPPORT TO AVAIL GOVT PROVISIONS



JANA VIKAS is making consistent efforts in the communities to aware people and provide handholding support to register PWMIs in the district medical. After the identification of the PWMIs and awareness at different villages, the project staff decided to take PWMIs to the District Mental Health Unit, Phulbani, the district headquarter to register and process for availing the medicine from the medical. Due to this process many PWMIs are identified, registered, accessed treatment and 153 are getting medicines from the District Mental Health Unit, Kandhamal for which PWMIs and care takers are happy for the support they receive from Jana Vikas.



E-SANJEEVANI



illness, Neurological disorder, substance use).

E-Sanjeevani is a government- owned telemedicine platform that provides access to health care service remotely, PWMI Project team played a vital role and took initiative to consult psychiatrist through E-Sanjeevani process to assist the patients, because of the unavailability of psychiatrist at district head quarter. Most of the patients were not accessing the medical facility as the district medical is far from the villages in the district as a result PWMIs are helpless. Thus, with this process 169 patients are registered under E-Sanjeevani of different categories of patients (Mental

This was for the first time in the district to organize E-Sanjeevani for the Mental Illness Persons and CHOs cooperated and many patients those who were not able to go to District Mental Health Unit could access these facilities.



PARTNERSHIP WITH AZIM PREMJI FOUNDATION:



Jana Vikas is proud to be a partner with a significant milestone in our ongoing efforts to preserve the rich forest ecosystems of Kandhamal. Our NGO has officially partnered with the **Azim Premji Foundation** to implement a comprehensive **Forest Preservation Project** in the region. This collaboration marks a major step forward in our mission to protect biodiversity, empower indigenous communities, and promote sustainable livelihoods through conservation-based initiatives.

The Azim Premji Foundation, known for its commitment to social and environmental causes, brings not only critical funding but also technical expertise, policy support, and grassroots engagement strategies. With their support, we aim to restore degraded forest areas, enhance community-led forest management, and introduce eco-friendly alternatives to harmful forest exploitation practices.

We are deeply grateful for the trust and shared vision with the Azim Premji Foundation. Together, we believe this initiative will contribute meaningfully to environmental sustainability and socio-economic upliftment in Kandhamal.

STAFF TRAINING ON FOREST RIGHTS AND MANAGEMENT

The Staff were provided trainings within the reported period on forest rights and management at JANA VIKAS training hall. Training was focused on Individual Forest Right (IFR), Community Forest Right (CFR) and Community Forest Resource Right (CFRR) under FRA-2006 and amended 2012 its provisions and proper implementation in the community.

The training was emphasized on the marketing of Non-Timber Forest Produces (NTFP) especially on Leaf plates, Mango, Siali leaves, Sal seed and leaves, Honey, Jhuna, Mahula, Gora, Amla, Bahada, Tamarind, Jack fruits, Mushroom, Tubers, Herbal medicine, Green leaves, etc. Trainings were given on Community Forest Resource Plan & Non-Timber Forest produce value addition and marketing to the project staff,

Govt has come out with guidelines DA-JUGA- for the development of Community Forest Management Plan (CFRMP) which was highlighted during the training by the staff Mr. Niranjana from PRADAN organization. Mr. Samiran Nayak, Program Manager, ITDA after observation of the survey on livelihood suggest us to apply for PMVDVY for Sirtiguda and Adimaha Gram Panchayats. Although a PMVDVY is already existing Sirtiguda but he suggested that, another can be formed comprise of other women members. He also assured the infrastructure and capacity building support to the Producer

FORMATION OF CFRMC

JANA VIKAS made eight attempt to form Community Forest Rights Management Committee (CFRMC) at Gram Sabha at the target villages in the presence of the local Sarpanch. A traditional leaders chaired the selection process. He asked the members to nominate the names and second the names of the members. 11 members were selected and these 11 membered committees further selected president, secretary and treasurer.

In order to preserve the forest and natural resources there was need of formation of Community Forest Resource Management Committee (CFRMC). During the training emphasis was given on the approval process by Gram Sabha for the plans made CFRMC.



PANCHAYAT LEVEL TRAINING FOR PRIs



the meeting and presented the entire baseline survey conducted across the 30 villages of Sirtiguda and Adimaha Gram Panchayat. Guidelines for **Ministry of Tribal Affairs** and guidelines as per **DA-JUGA** was discussed. Later baseline of Non timber forest produces collections and marketing village and house hold wise was presented. Discussion went around social security schemes such as pensions, job card and job under MGNREGA, benefits from line departments. All the members were happy to see the statistics clearly mentioned on these chart papers. They also validate the information.

The need for conservation of forest and formation of community forest resource management committee (CFRMC) at each village was discussed and need for developing community forest resource management plan (CFRMP), a Gram Panchayat level training was held on dated 26th March 2025 at Sirtiguda Gram Panchayat Training Hall, Sirtiguda, Block- K. Nuagaon, Kandhamal in the presence of Sarpanch, Panchayat Extension officer (PEO), Assistant Data Entry Operator (ADEO), Ward members. JANA VIKAS staff Mr. Arun Naik presented the purpose of

Sarpanch ensured that, she will try to remain present all the meeting while formation of community forest resource management committee (CFRMC) and drafting community forest resource management plan (CFRMP). She would also support accessing support from other departments apart from forest, Panchayat, Block, Department of Agriculture, Horticulture, fisheries and Animal Husbandry.

Samiti Sabhya also shared about other needs of irrigation and make attempts to departments like ITDA too. It is consensus made by all that, plan will be included in micro plans of all the departments.

Headmaster of the school also shared his experience in bringing up children with knowledge on forest and how community dependent on the forest for their social, cultural and economic needs. Emphasis should be given to younger generations who are leaving behinds families, villagers and earn for their livelihood and forget all the traditional practices which sustained their lives and forest.



EDUCATIONAL EMPOWERMENT



Educational Empowerment of the marginalized children in Kandhamal through exercising child rights

Jana Vikas has been providing **remedial and supplementary education** at **Village-Level Education Tuition Program** in partnership with local communities and education stakeholders to children in some of the villages. The initiative focuses on **after-school support**, **remedial education**, and **academic mentorship** to improve foundational learning among rural children. The main purpose of this program is to reduce dropout rates by **creating an enabling learning environment** and encouraging **parental engagement** and community ownership in children's education.

CASE STUDY

Name: Bleshi Baliarsingh, Age 10, Class V, Mardiponka Village

Bleshi, a first-generation learner, struggled to read even basic Odia sentences at the start of the program. Through regular tuition support and encouragement from her village tutor (Agapita B.Singh) she now reads fluently and secures good mark in her class. Her mother, part of a local SHG, now monitors her studies daily and actively participates in the center's activities.



The Village-Level Education Tuition Program by **Jana Vikas** has created a grassroots education support system that is responsive, inclusive, and community-driven. It has not only improved learning outcomes but also fostered educational aspirations among tribal & dalit children in Kandhamal. Continued support and scale-up of such models are crucial for ensuring education equity in remote regions.



CLIMATE CHANGE ACTION -VDMP



Looking into the vulnerability of Kandhamal district, the District Emergency Officer take the strategy of creating awareness and reduction of damage, the department has assigned some of the voluntary organizations to address the issues in different blocks. Jana Vikas is fortunate to be part of this process.

The Village Disaster Management Plan (VDMP) plays a crucial role in reducing disaster risks in Kandhamal, Odisha—a region vulnerable to landslides, forest fires, heavy rainfall, soil erosion, snake bite and lighting. By involving local communities in

identifying hazards, vulnerabilities, and capacities, VDMPs help in creating tailored mitigation and preparedness strategies. For example, identifying landslide-prone zones enables safer settlement planning, while community-led forest fire management—already seen among Kandhamal youth—reduces fire outbreaks.

These plans integrate Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR) into development activities like housing, roads, and agriculture, ensuring infrastructure is resilient. VDMPs also strengthen early warning systems, local response teams, and evacuation routes, reducing loss of life and property. Capacity-building efforts empower local volunteers, and regular drills ensure readiness.
